GOALS


- Narrow the opportunity gap for Boston middle school students by teaching career skills and building awareness of potential career pathways.







Seventh graders are introduced to our program with opportunities to meet with professionals and gain insights into local careers.

EXPLORATIONS



Eighth graders participate in six skills-based classes that teach self-presentation, communication, and self-advocacy skills. They select and are matched to one of our worksite partners where they apprentice for six weekly two hour sessions alongside of a professional and learn the culture and purpose of the business while putting their professional skills into practice.



LAUNCH

Upon completion of an apprenticeship, AL staff connects apprentices to our network of program partners and helps them apply for paid jobs, enrichment programs, and internships.



CITY SUMMER INTERNSHIP

Rising ninth grade girls participate in a paid summer internship that offers a deeper dive into careers in business and fields where women are underrepresented.

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LETTER FROM THE BOARD

An annual report is a comprehensive report on a company's activities throughout the preceding year. Annual reports are intended to give shareholders and other interested people information about the company's activities and financial performance. They may be considered as grey literature. Most jurisdictions require companies to prepare and disclose annual reports, and many require the annual report to be filed at the company's registry. Companies listed on a stock exchange are also required to report at more frequent intervals (depending upon the rules of the stock exchange involved).

Other information deemed relevant to stakeholders may be included, such as a report on operations for manufacturing firms or corporate social responsibility reports for companies with environmentally or socially sensitive operations. In the case of larger companies, it is usually a sleek, colorful, high-gloss publication.
